However, the walk must be done by the person — no -one can do it for them; and it is not easy. But at the end of the journey, it's been worth it all! Hopefully, the same will be said about your time with this programme.

Remember, it's <u>never too late</u> to join - if the Camino has already started, you are still welcome to come along to any of the meetings.



A Year for Priests

I've thought about priesthood, now what do I do...?



Once you have made the decision to look at priesthood as a viable option, the next step of the journey can be equally as difficult, albeit for different reasons, as you struggle to find answers to your questions, and wonder if anyone else is feeling this way.

Since 2003, the Archdiocese of Armagh has had in place a programme of accompaniment for those considering Diocesan Priesthood. The goal is to help men discern more fully what's involved in answering the call to priesthood.

In a relaxed and informal environment, the programme seeks to combine information with experience, as it introduces relevant topics to aid discernment in the prospective candidates; It also enables them to get to know one another, and realize that many people share similar feelings at times like these.

So What's Entailed?

The meetings occur once a month, and last for approximately 3 hours; 1 hour of prayer; 1 hour for discussion;

& 1 hour for 'fellowship' (ie a small meal or something); The meetings will be held in Armagh (please see timetable) to ease the pressure of traveling.

The meetings are open to everyone, but particularly those men who have made a decision to look more seriously at a vocation to priesthood. Members of the Diocesan Vocations Commission may also attend, and on occasion, lead the meeting.

The following topics are explored; The Christian Calling (Baptism); Grace; Prayer; Obedience; Sexuality; The Christian Virtues, especially courage (Confirmation); Discernment; & Service (The Eucharist).

What do I need to do?

Simply be there! The programme is not too demanding, perhaps some light reading or to prepare a piece of scripture for discussion. There is no cost, and best efforts will be made to facilitate men with transport should that be necessary. There are no exams or tests. Participants may be invited to evaluate a particular meeting or content, but that will be done anonymously.

Ok, I've done the meetings, does that mean I am ready, or have, to be a priest?

Not at all! This is merely a step along the way. Some people participate and then decide that priesthood is not for them. Others decide they would like to apply, but there is a full application process which must be followed, after which they may be refused. No matter what happens, most of those who have participated in the little progremme have benefited from it, and from the meeting of other men considering this step in life.

What's a Camino?

Oh, nearly forgot that... Camino is a Spanish word describing a "little way/walk". It's connected to the ancient pilgrimage across Europe to the resting place of the great St. James – In Compostella, Spain. Many thousands of pilgrims do this walk every year, and on it they learn a little about themselves, and about those whom they meet along the way.
