SHARING THE FAITH

In the Gospel of Mark, the Gospel for Liturgical Year (B), Jesus gives his disciples a share in his own mission (Mark 6:7-13).



They were sent out to preach and to heal. They were not, however, to rely on their own resources, but on the authority that was given to them and on the hospitality offered them. Should the audience prove unwelcoming or unreceptive, they were to move on without delay.

Jesus sent them out as apostles because Christianity is never something to be kept for oneself alone. It is primarily a spiritual message, to invite people to repent so as to allow God into their lives. This corresponds to our deepest needs and desires – it gives a meaning and a sense of direction to our lives, a reason to live and a reason to die. But Christianity is concerned not only with the spiritual, but also with emotional and physical healing. Its scope even now extends to the wellbeing of the whole person: “The Twelve drove out many demons, and they anointed with oil many who were sick and cured them” (v.13).

Pope Francis in his message for World Mission Day 2015 has this to say: “Every baptized person is called to bear witness to the Lord Jesus by proclaiming the faith received as a gift. Since Christ’s entire existence had a missionary character, so too, all who follow him closely must possess this missionary quality. As Vatican II stated: ‘The laity should cooperate in the Church’s missionary work of evangelisation, as witnesses and at the same time as

living instruments, they share in her saving mission’ (Ad Gentes, 41).” The first to whom the Gospel message must be preached are: “the poor, the little ones and the sick, those who are often looked down upon and forgotten, those who cannot repay us (cf. Luke 14:13-14).”

The duty of the Church is to help those in need. However, if the purpose of the Church is solely to care for the poor, to further justice and peace, then it becomes a human institution oriented to temporal goals. The primary mission of the Church is to preach the Good News of Jesus Christ so that all people will be brought into communion with the living God and into the fullness of the kingdom. Caring for the poor is an important aspect of the Church’s ultimate mission, that is, to invite “all people, scattered and divided by sin, into the unity of God’s family, the Church... to become, in the Holy Spirit, his adopted children and thus heirs to his blessed life” (Catechism of the Catholic Church, 1).

Speaking to leaders of the apostolate of the laity in Korea, Pope Francis said: “Your gifts as lay men and women are manifold and your apostolate varied, yet all that you do is meant to advance the Church’s mission by ensuring that the temporal order is permeated and perfected by Christ’s Spirit and ordered to the coming of his Kingdom.” The Church’s mission is concerned with both the temporal and eternal needs of people, an “integral

development open to the Absolute.” For Christ has brought ABUNDANT LIFE: “I have come so that they may have life and have it in abundance” (John 10:10).

In his message, the Pope refers to the Pontifical Mission Societies (PMS): “The Missionary Societies of the Successor of Peter have a universal apostolic horizon to facilitate the spread of the Gospel which is ‘the source of joy, liberation and salvation for all men and women.’ In the full range of the Church’s missionary activity, all the faithful are called to live their baptismal commitment to the fullest, in accordance with the personal situation of each.”

Last June, two members of World Missions Ireland staff, Jackie Pallas and Sally McEllistrim, together with Charlie Bird, the well-known broadcaster, set out for the Far East to capture on film the work of missionaries in South Korea and the Philippines, especially amongst the socially marginalised, the exploited and the forgotten. Missionaries work to enable them to live a life in keeping with their God-given dignity as a first step towards evangelization. A short DVD will be available for Mass-going congregations on Mission Sunday, while lengthier ones will be produced for schools, retreats and various groupings of clergy, religious and laity.

THE STORY BEHIND WORLD MISSIONS IRELAND POSTER

Mission Sunday

“I have come so that you can have life and live it to the full”. ‘Abundant’ life is the theme for our Mission Sunday Poster this year.

What does an abundant life mean? Like everything else it means different things to different people. For the thousands of desperate migrants, many of whom paid the ultimate price with their lives this year as they desperately tried to reach European shores, it means a chance for a better life. For the Christians persecuted for their faith, it means the freedom to live and profess that faith openly. For the people living on the margins it means inclusion as opposed to exclusion. At the very least it means dignity, hope and light. It means having something to eat, somewhere to sleep and something to believe in. It is at the core of mission and missionary work.

This year, two of our staff in World Missions Ireland, Jackie Pallas and Sally McEllistrim travelled to the Philippines and South Korea on a mission trip, accompanied by Journalist Charlie Bird. We decided on those two very different countries to show the vibrancy of our Church in Asia. The Catholic Church is growing rapidly in South Korea, it now numbers 5 million people and it is the second largest missionary sending country in the world. The Philippines has a long and proud tradition of Catholicism but for most of its people, poverty is a constant companion.

Our first photo is that of veteran Journalist Charlie Bird. He is pictured in Cebu in the Philippines amongst the dirt and the debris that the Badjao people have to endure. The Badjaos are amongst the most downtrodden in the country but are being championed by Presentation Missionary Sister Evelyn Flanagan who is lifting them up through education, hard work and her tireless missionary spirit. Evelyn herself is pictured in our next photo, just underneath Charlie. She is a happy, enthusiastic and hard working missionary and is doing trojan work to bring joy and hope to the Badjao people. They have huge respect for her and we were touched when one lady

said to us “Sr Evelyn is kind and fun; she is like a mother to us but above all she has stayed with us and has not abandoned us”. That is the true essence of missionaries. Sr Evelyn says that she is “Happy to be serving at the sharp end of missionary work; this is my true vocation”.

Our next picture is that of Pope Francis meeting our National Director, Fr Maurice Hogan in Rome. Fr Maurice says “Mission has to be outward looking and has to offer abundance; we are a presence, a witness and people relate to living witness more so than they do to learning about it in the traditional sense. Offering hope and dignity to the most cast aside and marginalised is at the core of what missionary priests and sisters give to people. The faith of missionaries drives them on; it is this faith that is their driving force which in turn helps to provide abundance in the lives of those they serve”.

Columban Fr. Shay Cullen has been a vocal and fearless crusader for the most exploited in the Philippines for over 45 years. He continues to rescue children and young adults from the clutches of abusers in all their guises and has built a haven for these vulnerable people. Without him their lives would be bleak and hopeless.

Next is where it all begins; an image of a baptism in the city of Manila. It was a truly special occasion to witness; families bringing their beautiful little children into the Church, recognising the graces and gifts that the sacrament of baptism bestows. Pope Francis has urged us not to forget the great gift we receive when we are christened “Our baptism has changed us, given us a new and glorious hope, and empowered us to bring God’s redeeming love to all, particularly the poor, in whom we see the face of Christ. Our baptism has also given us a share in the Church’s mission of evangelisation; as disciples, we are also missionaries”.



Korean sisters Julie and Bella certainly share their baptism and missionary gifts as they go amongst the people who live with the dead. Yes, you read that correctly. In Manila, 2,000 living souls have nothing and nowhere to live and have set up home in one of the biggest cemeteries in the teeming city. They are born, live and die in the graveyard. Sr Julie relates how she asks the people “What is the colour of your God, and they say yellow, the colour of hope”. She and Sr Bella are offering hope in abundance.

So, as you look through our World Missions Ireland poster please think and pray for all these missionaries and the many more who are a beacon of hope to those on the margins and to those people who have yet to hear the word of God. Please think and pray for those people who are suffering in so many ways in so many parts of the world. Mission Sunday is the one day when we are asked to give a financial offering, whatever we can, to show that we are standing with the people and the Younger Churches who are in constant need of our help. In 2014, over €1,781,000 was raised during our Mission Sunday collection and this money is making a huge difference to the lives of those who need it most. Your continuing help and prayers make this possible.

COMFORT THE AFFLICTED, AFFLICT THE COMFORTABLE

We could come back to our 'comfortable' lives. That was the overriding thought in my mind as we stood in the baking heat in Manila and watched children naked and crawling with lice and sores run about the cemetery where they live. Yes, the cemetery where they live.



Takes a while to sink in doesn't it?

We were three for our 'World Missions Ireland' trip to the Philippines and South Korea; Jackie Pallas and myself from WMI and we were joined by Journalist Charlie Bird. We have all seen some sights over our lives but none of us could really get our heads around the idea of people living in a cemetery. The reality of finally seeing it was shocking. Almost 2,000 people are born, live and die amongst the grey tombs. They have nowhere else to go. They scratch out a living looking after the tombs and are particularly busy during November, the month of the Holy Souls. Just one public toilet caters for all these living souls, they have no running water; they have no electricity bar those who 'jump' it illegally putting themselves in mortal danger of electrocution. They are not on any tourist guide; they are invisible to most people, most of them don't even have a birth certificate. It is a shocking indictment of their society to think that they are only acceptable to the dead.

They have hope however and that hope takes the form of two Korean Columban Sisters, Sr Julie and Sr Bella. The two missionary sisters began helping them and working with them in 2011. Sr Julie says "When I first saw

them they were like animals; eating and drinking from the ground, it was shocking and sad. We have done a lot of work with them; we have feeding programmes, we have taught them about hygiene and personal health, we have taught them about respect for others and themselves but it is an uphill battle. Their lives are a constant daily struggle. I say to them "what colour is your God and they say yellow, the colour of hope".

Offering hope and dignity to the most cast aside and marginalised is at the core of what missionary priests and sisters do. We saw plenty of examples of their sterling work both in the Philippines and South Korea during our mission visit. We saw it in the eyes of the children rescued from paedophiles and other abusers by Fr. Shay Cullen in Olango. His 40 odd years in the Philippines have not dimmed his fervour for the rights of children to a happy, innocent and risk free childhood; we wondered what would have happened to the Badjao people, sea gypsies, whose very name means 'of no value' were it not for the passion of Presentation Sister Evelyn Flanagan, a vocal and tireless defender of their rights; Limerick Columban Noel O'Neill would put any business magnate to shame such is his success in building factories which employ

people with intellectual disabilities, all of whom now have the dignity of work and enjoy such commercial success that they now number Incheon Airport in Korea as one of their clients. Staying in Korea, we had the privilege of standing with the people of Ceju who are opposing the construction of a massive naval base. We only stood with them for one day but Pat Cunningham from Westmeath is there day after day. He passionately believes in their right to protest and as peace and justice coordinator for the Columbans in Korea he walks the walk. He is at the peace camp where he stares down the Police and tries his best to stop the juggernauts intent on constructing this blight on the landscape. Of course if it was just a blight on the landscape that would be bad enough but we all know the far more serious consequences of a massive naval base in Korea. Fr Moon, a local Jesuit who also maintains a presence at the peace camp told me "We are in agony here with this development but the Columbans reached out to us and are standing with us, like the Good Samaritan". Back in Seoul, Frs. Donal O'Keefe, Sean Conneely and Liam O'Keefe are just some who concelebrate the weekly open air mass for the people drowned in the ferry disaster last year. The families of the deceased are still waiting for justice.

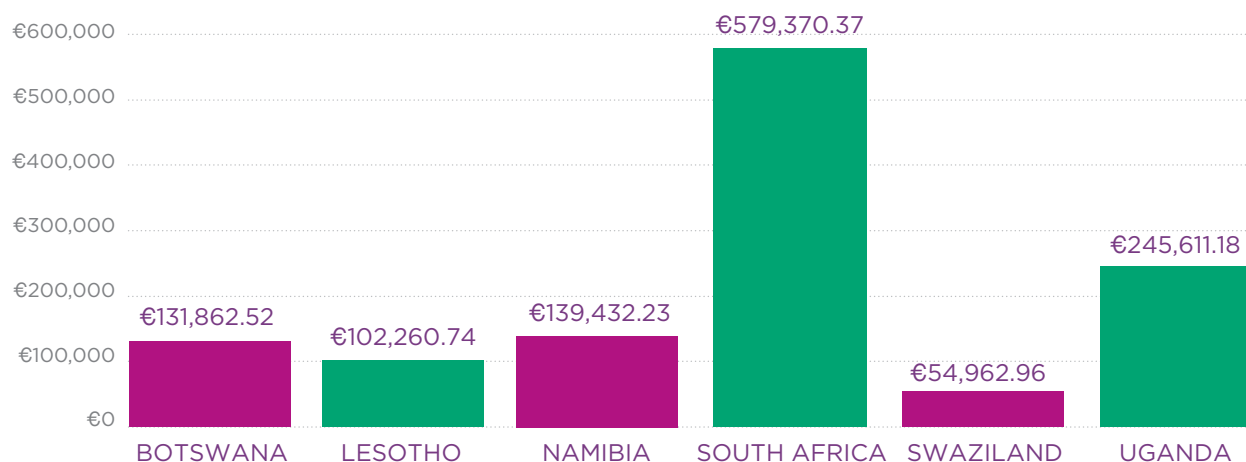
Sr Nora Wiseman from Cork is larger than life and has created a lovely old people's home in Chuncheon where the residents are cherished, loved and valued. One of the most touching and surreal moments there was listening to one of the residents, a tiny little Korean lady of about 90 singing Danny Boy! Cherished loved and valued too are the people living with Aids in Seoul in a welcoming haven provided by Sr. Miriam Cousins. Rejected and ostracised by their families, Miriam has brought them into the wider 'missionary family' who take care of them and treat them as people not as objects of derision.

This is but a very short overview of our World Missions Ireland mission trip and just a tiny glimpse into the worlds and work of our missionaries abroad. For me, one of the Columbans in Seoul, Denis Monaghan, summed it up better than I ever could. "Missionary work is like shovelling light into a dark hole".

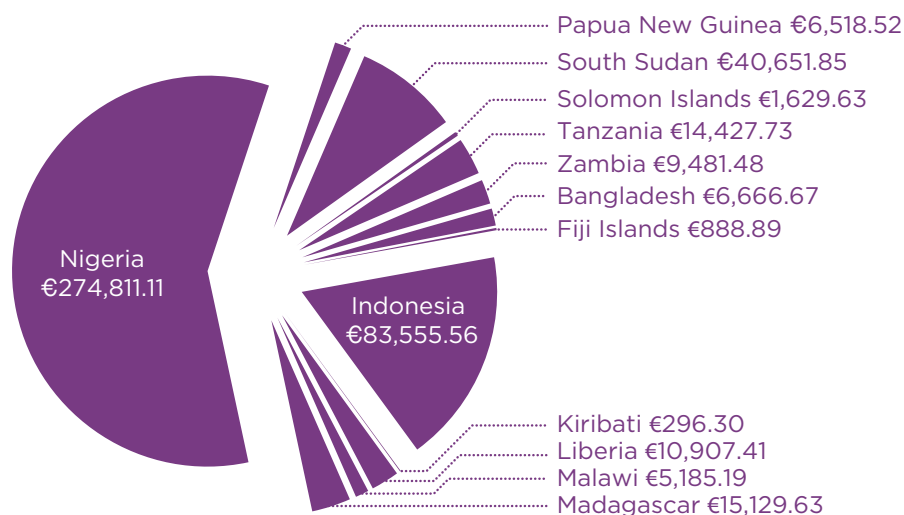
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HOW MONEY COLLECTED IN 2013 WAS DISTRIBUTED IN 2014

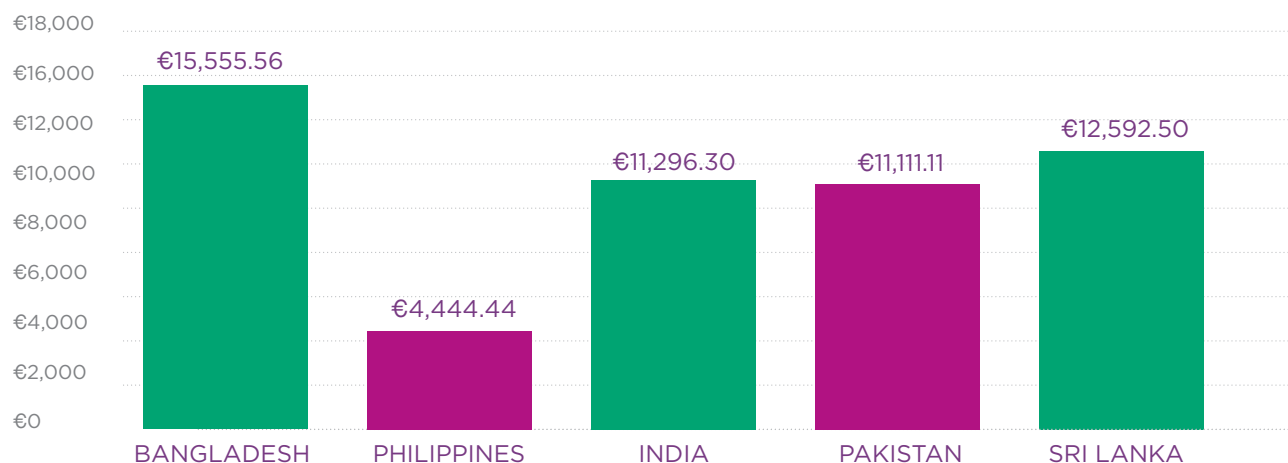
SOCIETY FOR THE PROPAGATION OF THE FAITH [€1,253,500]

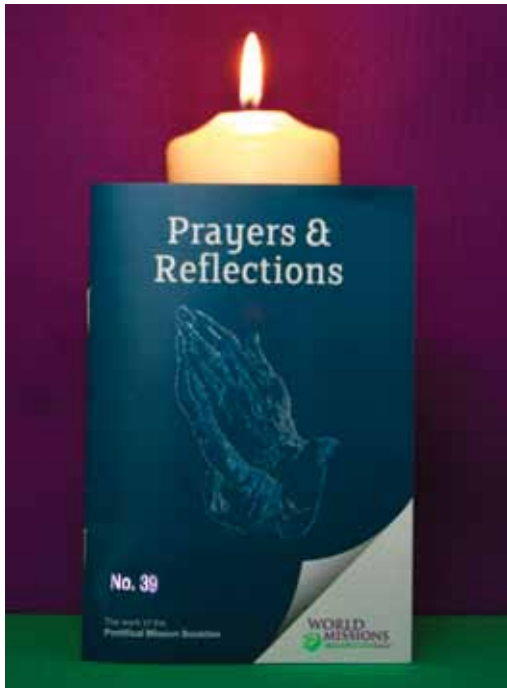
